Nikita the Stylite, Wonderworker of Pereyaslavl'—Zalesskii (786). Martyrs Meletius Stratelates, Stephen, John, and 1,218 soldiers, with women and children, including Serapion the Egyptian, Callinicus the Magician, Theodore, Faustus, the women: Marciana, Susanna, and Palladia, two children: Cyriacus and Christian, and twelve Tribunes—Faustus, Festus, Marcellus, Theodore, Meletius, Sergius, Marcellinus, Felix, Photinus, Theodoriscus, Mercurius, and Didymus, all of whom suffered in Galatia (138-161). 
LEX ORANDI, LEX CREDENDI, LEX VIVENDI

The liturgy is not something one experiences. Liturgy is not a 3 hour show on a Sunday morning. Liturgy is not where you talk to your best friend. Liturgy is life. Sounds a bit weird when one thinks about it. How can liturgy be life? As the title reads: Lex Orandi, Lex Credendi, Lex Vivendi: "The law of Worship determines the law of Faith determines the law of Life". This 5th century Latin term began to be incorporated into the life of the church. Liturgy is life because it forms not only what we do on a Sunday morning but it forms our entire life. Corinthians chapter 10 accounts the Eucharistic practice and not only does it mention the Eucharist but the climax of the Eucharist is partaken within the contexts of the unity of the community of the believers. The Eucharist is formed and shaped by the community of believers. If this is true and if we are to accept this "formula" then this is how liturgy is life! Liturgy representing life is then something not we do every Sunday rather it is lived out by the entire community on a daily basis. How can liturgy be life on a Wednesday afternoon in the middle of work school or whatever is might be?

7TH SUNDAY OF PASCHA/ HOLY FATHERS OF THE FIRST ECUMENICAL COUNCIL AT NICAEA/AFTERFEAST OF THE ASCENSION

Troparion Tone 6 (Resurrection)

The Angelic <u>Pow</u>ers were at Thy tomb; the guards became as <u>dead</u> men.

Mary <u>stood</u> by Thy grave, seeking Thy most pure <u>bo</u>dy.

Thou didst capture hell not being <u>tempted</u> by it.

Thou didst come to the Virgin, <u>granting</u> life.//

O Lord, Who didst rise from the dead, <u>glo</u>ry to Thee.

Troparion Tone 4 (Ascension)

Thou hast ascended in glory, O <u>Christ</u> our God, granting joy to Thy Disciples by the promise of the Holy <u>Spir</u>it. Through the blessing <u>they</u> were assured, that Thou art the <u>Son</u> of God,// the Re<u>deem</u>er of the world!

Troparion Tone 8 (Fathers)

Thou art most <u>glo</u>rious, O <u>Christ</u> our God, Who hast es<u>tablished</u> the <u>Holy Fathers as lights</u> on the earth. Through them Thou hast <u>guided</u> us to the <u>true Faith.//</u> O greatly com<u>passionate One</u>, <u>glory</u> to Thee!

Kontakion Tone 8 (Fathers)

The Apostles' <u>preaching</u> and the <u>Fa</u>thers' doctrines have established one <u>Faith</u> for the Church.

Adorned with the <u>robe</u> of truth, <u>wo</u>ven from heavenly the<u>ol</u>ogy,// It defines and <u>glo</u>rifies the great <u>mys</u>tery of <u>pi</u>ety.

Kontakion Tone 6 (Ascension)

When Thou hadst fulfilled the dispensation for our sake, and didst unite earth to heaven:

Thou didst ascend in glory, O Christ our God, not being parted from those who love Thee, but remaining with them and crying://
"I am with you, and there is no one against you!"

Prokeimenon Tone 4 (Song of the Three Children)

Blessed art thou, O Lord God of our fathers, and praised and glorified is Thy name forever! (Song of the three Holy Children, v. 3)

v: For Thou art just in all that Thou hast done for us! (v. 4)

Alleluia Verses Tone 1

Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!

v: The Lord, the God of gods, speaks and summons the earth from the rising of the sun to its setting. (Ps 49/50:1)

Magnify, O my soul, Christ the Giver of Life, Who has ascended from earth to heaven! We magnify thee, O Mother of God, who beyond reason and understanding gavest birth in time to the Timeless One.

Again, we pray to Thee, O Lord our God, that you would renew us and this parish by the Power of the Holy Spirit. Fill us with love and longing for Thee. Grant that we would seek not our own will but to do Thy will in all things and to be willing to lay down our lives out of love for Thee and for our neighbor. Draw thirsty souls to this place and remove their spiritual blindness, granting them through Thy grace to see the beauty of Thy Holy Glory in this place. Fill this community with new life, spiritual vigor and an insatiable desire to live godly and holy lives. Forgive us all of our sins as we fall down before Thee. Bring us all to a greater repentance and to an amendment of our lives as we look to Thee, the only Merciful and loving Lord Who calls all to salvation. We beg Thee, our merciful Lord, hear us, grant all of these petitions and all of our requests unto salvation: We pray Thee, hearken and have mercy.

THE APOSTLE CARPOS OF THE SEVENTY



Carpos was one of the Seventy Apostles. He was a follower and companion of the Apostle Paul by whom he was appointed as bishop of Varna in Thrace. He also preached the Gospel in Crete where he received St. Dionysius the Areopagite in his home. St. Dionysius testifies that Carpos was a man with an exceptionally pure mind, meekness and innocence and that the Lord Jesus, with His angels, appeared to him in a vision, and that he never began the Divine Liturgy unless he did not had a heavenly vision beforehand. In his Letter VIII, St. Dionysius the Areopagite related a story from St Carpos that he had once wished for the death of two sinners who were vexing him. The Lord appeared in a vision to him and said: "Strike against Me in future, for I am ready, even again, to suffer for the salvation of men; and this is pleasing to Me, provided that other men do not commit sin. But see, whether it is well for thee to exchange the dwelling in the chasm, and with serpents, for that with God, and the good and philanthropic angels." Enduring many assaults for the Name of Christ, he finally suffered at the hands of the unbelieving Jews and was killed and, with his soul, took up habitation in the kingdom of God to delight eternally gazing upon the Lord in glory.

REFLECTION FROM ST. NIKOLAI VELIMIROVICH

We should not desire the death of a sinner, but his repentance. Nothing grieves the Lord more, Who suffered on the Cross for sinners, then when we pray to Him for the death of a sinner and thereby to remove him from our path. It happened that the Apostle Carpos lost his patience and began to pray that God send down death upon two sinful men; one a pagan and the other an apostate from the Faith. Then the Lord Christ Himself appeared to Carpos and said: "Strike me; I am prepared to be crucified again for the salvation of mankind." St. Carpos related this event to St. Dionysius the Areopagite and he wrote it down and gave it to the Church as a lesson to all, that prayers are needed for sinners to be saved and not for them to be destroyed, "for the Lord is not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance" (2 Peter 3:9).



ON THE FEAST OF THE ASCENSION

Jesus did not live with his disciples after his resurrection as he had before his death. Filled with the glory of his divinity, he appeared at different times and places to his people, assuring them that it was he, truly alive in his risen and glorified body.



glorification with God the Father, together with the great joy which his disciples had as they received the promise of the Holy Spirit who was to come to assure the Lord's presence with them, enabling them to be his witnesses to the ends of earth (*Lk 24:48-53; Acts 1:8-11; Mt 28:20; Mk 16:16-14*).

In the Church the believers in Christ celebrate these very same realities with the conviction that it is for them and for all men that Christ's departure from this world has taken place. The Lord leaves in order to be glorified with God the Father and to glorify us with himself. He goes in order to "prepare a place" for and to take us also into the blessedness of God s presence. He goes to open the way for all flesh into the "heavenly sanctuary ... the Holy Place not made by hands" (see Hebrews 8-10).
