
PRAYER FOR CHURCH GROWTH

Troparion Tone 7 (Resurrection)

By Your <u>Cross</u> You destroyed <u>death</u>.

To the thief You opened <u>Paradise</u>.

For the <u>Myrrh</u>bearers You changed weeping into <u>joy</u>.

And You commanded Your disciples, O <u>Christ</u> God, to pro<u>claim</u> that You are <u>risen</u>,//
granting the <u>world</u> great <u>mercy</u>.

Troparion of the Feast Tone 1

When You, O Lord, were baptized in the Jordan, the worship of the Trinity was made manifest. For the voice of the Father bore witness to You, calling You His Beloved Son; and the Spirit in the form of a dove confirmed the truthfulness of His word.

O Christ our God, You have revealed Yourself,// and have enlightened the world, glory to You!

Troparion Tone 4 (St Gregory)

In truth you were revealed to your flock as a <u>rule</u> of faith, an image of humility and a teacher of <u>ab</u>stinence; your humility ex<u>alted</u> you; your poverty en<u>riched</u> you. Hierarch Father <u>Gregory</u> entreat <u>Christ</u> our God// that our souls may be saved!

Kontakion Tone 7 (Resurrection)

The dominion of death can no longer hold mankind <u>cap</u>tive, for Christ descended, shattering and destroying its <u>powers</u>. Hell is <u>bound</u>, while the Prophets rejoice and cry: "The Savior has come to <u>those</u> in faith;// enter, you faithful, into the Resurrection!"

Kontakion Tone 1 (St Gregory)

You kept <u>watch</u> with the eyes of your soul, holy <u>bishop</u>, revealing yourself as a watchful <u>pas</u>tor for the world.

With the <u>staff</u> of your wisdom and your fervent inter<u>ces</u>sion, you drove away all <u>her</u>etics like wolves.//

You preserved your flock free from harm, most wise Gregory.

Kontakion of the Feast Tone 4

Today You have shone forth to the <u>world</u>, O Lord, and the light of Your countenance has been <u>marked</u> on us. Knowing You, we sing Your <u>praises</u>: "You have come and re<u>vealed</u> Yourself,// O unapproachable Light."

Prokeimenon Tone 1 (Sunday after Theophany)

Let Your mercy, O Lord, be upon us as we have set our hope on You! (Ps 32/33:22) v: Rejoice in the Lord, O your righteous! Praise befits the just! (Ps 32/33:1)

Alleluia Verses Tone 5

Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia.

v: I will sing of Your mercies, O Lord, forever; with my mouth I will proclaim Your truth from generation to generation. (Ps 88/89:1)

Preparing for a House Blessing

It is a joy to bless your home and/or business. To have your home or business blessed in an orderly manner, please prepare with the following in mind:

At a table covered in a white cloth, or icon corner (preferably facing east, if possible), have:

- a bowl filled with Holy Water (if you have none, Father will bring extra),
- an icon of the feast, or of Christ, or of the Theotokos,
- a candle on a candle stand,
- a prayer slip listing the names of those whom you would like to have remembered in prayer, with those fallen asleep listed in on one side and those living in the household on the other side.

All TVs, radios, and other sources of sound need to be turned off. Open the doors to all rooms. If done in the evening, have the lights on in each room. Also, please secure pets as necessary. If possible, please have someone ready to lead the priest through the home/business. Invite some friends!

FROM ON THE BAPTISM OF CHRIST: A SERMON FOR THE DAY OF THE LIGHTS By ST GREGORY OF NYSSA

Christ, then, was born as it were a few days ago—He Whose generation was before all things, sensible and intellectual. To-day He is baptized by John that He might cleanse him who was defiled, that He might bring the Spirit from above, and exalt man to heaven, that he who had fallen might be raised up and he who had cast him down might be put to shame. And marvel not if God showed so great earnestness in our cause: for it was with care on the part of him who did us wrong that the plot was laid against us; it is with forethought on the part of our Maker that we are saved. And he, that evil charmer, framing his new device of sin against our race, drew along his serpent train, a disguise worthy of his own intent, entering in his impurity into what was like himself,—dwelling, earthly and mundane as he was in will, in that creeping thing.

But Christ, the repairer of his evil-doing, assumes manhood in its fulness, and saves man, and becomes the type and figure of us all, to sanctify the first-fruits of every action, and leave to His servants no doubt in their zeal for the tradition. Baptism, then, is a purification from sins, a remission of trespasses, a cause of renovation and regeneration...

And this gift it is not the water that bestows (for in that case it were a thing more exalted than all creation), but the command of God, and the visitation of the Spirit that comes sacramentally to set us free. But water serves to express the cleansing. For since we are wont by washing in water to render our body clean when it is soiled by dirt or mud, we therefore apply it also in the sacramental action, and display the spiritual brightness by that which is subject to our senses. Let us however, if it seems well, persevere in enquiring more fully and more minutely concerning Baptism, starting, as from the fountain-head, from the Scriptural declaration, "Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." Why are both named, and why is not the Spirit alone accounted sufficient for the completion of Baptism? Man, as we know full well, is compound, not simple: and therefore the cognate and similar medicines are assigned for healing to him who is twofold and conglomerate:—for his visible body, water, the sensible element,—for his soul, which we cannot see, the Spirit invisible, invoked by faith, present unspeakably. For "the Spirit breathes where He wills, and thou hearest His voice, but canst not tell whence He cometh or whither He goeth." He blesses the body that is baptized, and the water that baptizes.
