PRAYER FOR CHURCH GROWTH



THE CIRCUMCISION OF OUR LORD AND GOD AND SAVIOR JESUS CHRIST & SAINT BASIL THE GREAT

You, Who, gave the Law to the world and to man, You, the Law-giver, placed Yourself under the Law, Others, you enjoined by impostition -Yourself, voluntarily. That is why on the eighth day, in the flesh, You were circumcised. In fulfilling the Law, with a new one You replaced it: Circumcision of the flesh, was replaced with a spiritual one. That impure passions we cut off from ourselves And with a spirit pure, to gaze upon You. That, with the spirit, the will of the body to cut and to constrict, Your will, O Savior, by the spirit we fulfill it -To this circumcision, the saints learned, Their fiery example, to us, they left. Wonderful Basil, to a glowing ray, similar, To such circumcision, generations, he teaches. To Basil, be glory, Your servant, Great, because of You, humble and constrained He became. That is why he became great, Great He remained.

EXAPOSTILARION OF THE FEAST AND ST BASIL THE GREAT

With the desire of love of wisdom thou didst cut away that which covered thy soul, O father, and in thy miracles wast shown to the world to be like the sun; and thou hast illumined the thoughts of the faithful, O divinely wise Basil, initiate of the mysteries of the Trinity and servant of the Theotokos.

Glory to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit, now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

The Creator of the ages, Who hath fulfilled the law, is circumcised in the flesh as a babe eight days of age; He is wrapped in swaddling bands as a man; He is fed with milk Who, as God, sustaineth all things by His infinite might and holdeth all things in His hand.

THE CIRCUMCISION OF OUR LORD AND SAVIOR JESUS CHRIST

On the eighth day after His Nativity, our Lord Jesus Christ was circumcised in accordance with the Old Testament Law. All male infants underwent circumcision as a sign of God's Covenant with the holy Forefather Abraham and his descendants [Genesis 17:10-14, Leviticus 12:3]. After this ritual, the Divine Infant was given the name Jesus, as the Archangel Gabriel declared on the day of the Annunciation to the Most Holy Theotokos [Luke 1:31-33, 2:21]. The Fathers of the Church explain that the Lord, the Creator of the Law, underwent circumcision in order to give people an example of how faithfully the divine ordinances ought to be fulfilled. The Lord was circumcised so that later no one would doubt that He had truly assumed human flesh, and that His Incarnation was not merely an illusion, as certain heretics had taught. In the New Testament, the ritual of circumcision gave way to the Mystery of Baptism, which it prefigured [Colossians 2:11-12]. Accounts of the Feast of the Circumcision of the Lord continue in the Eastern Church right up through the fourth century. The Canon of the Feast was written by Saint Stephen of the Saint Sava Monastery. In addition to circumcision, which the Lord accepted as a sign of God's Covenant with mankind, He also received the Name Jesus [Savior] on the eighth day after His Nativity as an indication of His service, the work of the salvation of the world [Matthew 1:21; Mark 9:38-39, 16:17; Luke 10:17; Acts 3:6, 16; Philippians 2:9-10]. These two events -- the Lord's Circumcision and Naming -- remind Christians that they have entered into a New Covenant with God and "are circumcised with a circumcision made without hands, in putting off the body of the sins of the flesh by the circumcision of Christ" [Colossians 2:11]. The very name "Christian" is a sign of mankind's entrance into a New Covenant with God.

SYNAXIS OF THE 70 APOSTLES

The Synaxis of the 70 Apostles was established by the Church to indicate the equal honor of each of the 70. They were sent two by two by the Lord Jesus Christ to go before Him into the cities He would visit (Luke 10:1). Besides the celebration of the Synaxis of the Holy Disciples, the Church celebrates the memory of each of them during the course of the year, on a multitude of different feastdays. With the Descent of the Holy Spirit the 70 Apostles preached in various lands. Some accompanied the 12 Apostles, like the holy Evangelists Mark and Luke, or Saint Paul's companion Timothy, or Prochorus, the disciple of the holy Evangelist John the Theologian, and others. Many of them were thrown into prison for Christ, and many received the crown of martyrdom. There are two more Apostles of the 70: Saint Cephas, to whom the Lord appeared after the Resurrection (1 Cor. 15:5-6), and Simeon, called Niger (Acts 13:1). They also were glorified by apostolic preaching. There are discrepancies in some lists of the 70 Apostles. In a list attributed to Saint Dorotheus of Tyre (June 5) some names are repeated (Rodion, or Herodion, Apollos, Tychicus, Aristarchus), while others are omitted (Timothy, Titus, Epaphras, Archippus, Aguila, Olympas). Saint Demetrius of Rostov consulted the Holy Scripture, the traditions passed down by the Fathers, and the accounts of trustworthy historians when he attempted to correct the mistakes and uncertainties in the list in compiling his collection of Lives of the Saints. The Church in particular venerates and praises the 70 Apostles because they taught us to honor the Trinity One in Essence and Undivided.
